Lasagna Dinner ~ *California on the Brink*

Optimism for California's future ran high at the Tri-League of Women Voters' 20th Annual Lasagna Supper. Dowell Myers, USC School of Policy, Planning and Development, presented a plan for shared success rather than the picture of doom and gloom we've become accustomed to. Myers presented a picture of California caught up in "the old story" of California and needing to focus on a new story. He contrasted the California of the past characterized by accelerating immigration, unassimilated immigrants, a surplus of educated workers mostly from other states and countries, a state swamped by migration and soaring housing prices, with today's California of declining immigration, upwardly mobile immigrants, a "homegrown" majority population with undereducated new workers and a soaring senior population that will be unable to sell their big homes unless California educates its young population.

"California on the Brink" was the topic and Professor Myers asked - "on the brink of what!" A demographer with degrees and studies conducted at Columbia, Berkeley, MIT and Harvard, he informed us that he "knows the answer to everything!" and then proceeded to prove it by helping us understand the current situation in our State and focusing us on the need to "grow more educated people." The first step is for people to look at the "new story" which offers hope for our future and to set the stage for a "new, responsible California." State and Local governments must invest in education and in the young or we will be unable to cope with our economic changes. In order for us all to enjoy our increasing age, we must invest in young people – we need to take responsibility and "pay for education." We've lost track of the typical cycle of roles in which we invest in children who then become workers as young adults, growing into mature adults who can provide the strong support for seniors and the children to come. Professor Myers emphasized the intergenerational connections that many Californians have forgotten and stressed that our ration of young people to seniors is extreme with the boomer generation entering senior citizenship. He noted that this explained why the current Obama administration is so focused on health care!

People are running on the old mythology, he noted. And this is no longer true. Because the key to a solid democracy is a well educated electorate, the role of the League of Women Voters is clear. He encouraged us to "get people on the same page" and "invest in the younger generation" because for every dollar invested in education there is a three-fold return.

Professor Myers' talk stimulated a lively question and answer session and a great deal of thought and optimism for our future. A book he cited is: *Immigrants and Boomers: Forging a New Social Contract for the Future of America*. In that book Myers calls for a new social contract between the older and younger generations, based on their mutual interests and the moral responsibility of each generation to provide for children and the elderly.

El Segundo's Carbon Calculator Program for City Residents

The City of El Segundo is now making available to residents a computer program which allows property owners to measure the amount of carbon they produce from their home and from the amount of traveling they do (their carbon footprint). A local business – CyberCity 3D – has developed this program and by using aerial photographs of a city, the company builds a low cost 3D city model and partners with Google Earth to enhance the content and display capabilities.

CyberCity3D has provided El Segundo with two products: 1) a three-dimensional business map that is accessible via the City's business website. Businesses interested in moving to El Segundo where space is available can then contact the property owners. 2) The Carbon Calculator which provides a website (www.ecocities3d.com) for each property owner to locate their home and register meaningful carbon footprint information associated with that residence. Participation is free and voluntary. Those who join fill out a short questionnaire providing their energy bill totals, car miles driven, plane travel and recycling habits. Using this data, the program calculates the carbon footprint (CO2 emissions) for the household. Citizens can also learn what they can do to "take action" to help reduce their emissions, save money and become more energy conscientious. Citizens can also explore their neighborhood in 3D.

Of the South Bay Cities, at present, El Segundo is the only city using this program, however, on March 25th CyberCity3D is providing a demonstration of their program to the So. Bay Council of Governments (SBCOG) and how it helps to get citizens involved in their cities' Green programs.

Feedback from LWV members attending the Climate Change Copenhagen Meeting

The LWVUS was represented by a team of eight well-qualified delegates who covered specific aspects of the conference and have provided feedback in the Feb. National League Leaders Guide. A sample of the comments from two of our representatives are quoted below:

Ellyn Murphy, PhD, hydrologist and head of the carbon sequestration initiative at Pacific No.West Lab. "Even though the organization of the meeting was chaotic, the negotiations were even more chaotic and the inability of the Council of Parties to reach a binding agreement with meaningful reductions in greenhouse gases was very disappointing. The U.S., now so more than ever, needs to pass a climate bill. Without a strong climate bill, we will fall further behind in renewable energy and become more dependent on foreign sources of energy and energy technology."

Jennifer Searfoss, JD, lecturer on international diplomacy and head of climate awareness in Orange County, CA for the Sierra Club: "We will all watch to see who steps up to support the Accord and how ambitious their committed emissions reductions targets really are. There are also indications coming from the U.S. Special Envoy on Climate Change that they plan to negotiate a binding deal outside the normal U.N. process to escape the negotiation difficulties they experienced in Copenhagen. In all, as we begin 2010, we must pass legislation through the U.S. Senate curbing our carbon emissions. Pres. Obama has challenged Congress to pass legislation by June. My hope is that America sets ambitious emission reduction targets that require the U.S. to stretch ourselves. We are the leaders of the free world; it's time for our country to act like it."
